Numbers, NUMBERS, Numbers......

Times have changed for the better in many cases since the times last century when we oldies raced. We were not allowed to "crash protect" our production bikes. The crank cases were not to be reinforced to stop oil escaping if they ground through. Some did add welding to the inside if there was room. No protection for the instruments that often took the brunt of a crash, so one handlebar maker made flat bars that instead of being straight across the top of the forks had a large circle that just happened to go round the instruments. No crash bars or crash knobs. I made up side number plate brackets of strong steel mounted to the top of the rear shocks and the indicator mount that stuck out past the seat meaning when I crashed it damaged the plastic number plate instead of shredding the seat.

On the subject of numbers, up until the early 1970's all race bike number backgrounds had to be white with a set sized black number on it, or the opposite if you had a bike with a white fairing on it. By the way like the racing cars of the time you were not to have anything but the bike and or your name on the side.

Then we moved to the best system ever, I think. Strict colour and number size to easily identify each bike and the class it was running in. It may not seem much to riders at the time but now trying to identify photos from back when we raced, it has become a great clue to who and what bike is. Even in a black and white photo the bike size is often revealed by the shade of black or white of the plate.

Ever since F1 boss Bernie took over the running of Motorcycle GP racing and he allowed riders to use "the anything goes" system used by the cars it has been very difficult to read numbers in photos with the multi coloured and artistic fonts or just difficult from many angles.







This system has filtered all the way to domestic racing and it is disappointing on a few levels. Yes, using the transponders means riders lap times are recorded and that is very important. Think of this if we were to have a power failure would the lap scorers be able to read your numbers as you flashed by.

The big problem I have as a photographer is now usually a rider has a number where the headlight should be and one on top of the duck tail. I often find I have to take a shot of the rider coming to me before I do a side on so I have an identifying marker of who it is. I am very pleased that more and more riders are now using the popular idea of a small white disc with their number in black on each side of the fairing down low so it can be seen with the bike heeled over in a photo.



If you don't think it is important, I went looking for examples of poor numbering to realise I don't have many because If I can't identify a rider when editing I usually just delete it and often think what a shame as it was a good shot but I don't know who is in it.



I think it is a great thing that some of you are forming up into teams with matching bikes to give a very professional image but its not going to take long before someone looks at a photo and asks which team members it is in the photos and no one knows because they can't read the number!



Another big problem actually discussed at the AGM is with less than 100 of you <u>WHY</u> do we have so many clashing numbers. Some of it has come about because a rider has sold a bike to someone in another class and they have kept the number because they are in a different race.

Riders it is time to think about this and some of you change your number. (See a list of registered rider numbers in the following pages – Ed).

The thing here is as a photographer, commentator or spectator it would make our lives so much better if we could just easily read your number, and yours alone, to know who you are.



Numbers - Background, Colour and Size

Following on from Ken's article, below are the background and number colours for "Modern" bikes in Section 7 of the 2022 MoMS. These colours and sizes apply to all bikes competing in Tasmania except for Log Booked Historic bikes. Log Booked Historic bikes must conform to the colours and sizes as listed in Section 8 of the 2022 MoMS.

7.11.2 Number Plate Colours

7.11.2.1 Number plate colours for Senior and Junior Competition must be as follows:

- 7.11.2.2 Additional colour combinations may be used, at the discretion of the RCB.
- 7.11.2.3 Australian Superbikes may use any contrasting colour on side number plates providing they are legible at 20 metres.
- 7.11.3 Number Plate Figures
- 7.11.3.1 Unless otherwise specified in SRs, Road Race discipline Senior number figures must be Arial Rounded MT Bold font the serif on number '1' must be removed.

7.11.3.2 Figures must be clearly legible, the minimum being:

DIMENSION	MEASUREMENT (mm)
Height	140
Width of each figure	75
Space between 2 figures	25
Space between figures and edge of number panel	12

- 7.11.3.3 Unless otherwise specified in SRs, number plates for Juniors must be as follows:
 - a) A minimum plate size of 225mm width and 200mm height,
 - b) Figures with minimum sizes of 100mm height and 20mm width of stroke.

8.7.2 Number Plate Colours

8.7.2.1 Colours must be as follows:

8.7.3 Number Plate Figures

- 8.7.3.1 Font style is free; however, the onus for legibility rests with the entrant.
- 8.7.3.2 Figures must be clearly legible, the minimum dimensions being:

Height	140
Width of each figure	75
Space between figures	25
Space between figures and edge of plate	12
